#### A Message from Pastor Barnett



"Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last, but we do it to get a crown that will last forever."

1 Corinthians 9:24-25

Lent is that time in Spring which invites a sense of renewal, a chance to clear out the clutter that accumulates over time in our hearts. Just as we engage in spring cleaning to make our physical spaces more invit-

ing and organized, this season calls us to reflect on our spiritual lives. Lent, as a period of preparation and introspection, offers an opportunity to assess and clean the spiritual nooks and crannies of our lives, allowing us to focus on what nourishes our souls rather than what weighs us down. The practice of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving during this time can serve as our spiritual broom, sweeping away distractions and helping us realign our priorities with our faith.



In this context, religious services take on profound significance as communal spaces for believers to gather, share experiences, and refocus on God. During Lent, we explore themes of repentance and hope. Our gatherings become moments of collective spring cleaning, where we confess, seek forgiveness, and draw strength from shared faith. In a world that prioritizes individualism, worship reminds us of our interconnectedness within the church.

The Covid pandemic exacerbated challenges related to spiritual discipline and community engagement, leading to a loss of regular fellowship and making it difficult to maintain spiritual routines. While online services provided a lifeline, they often lacked the tactile warmth of in-person gatherings. This experience highlighted the importance of commitment to spiritual practices and community, prompting us to reconsider our faith engagement. Without the accountability of physical gatherings, many have struggled to uphold their spiritual disciplines, raising questions about fostering genuine connection and growth in the digital age.

As we look to the future of Lent, we must consider how it intersects with the culture of convenience that permeates our modern lives. In a world where instant gratification reigns and fast food is available at every corner, many have grown accustomed to picking what they desire with minimal effort. This convenience mentality can extend to spiritual practices, leading to a lack of discipline in our faith lives. Lent calls us to embrace struggle, sacrifice, and intentionality—practices that may feel counter-cultural in an age that offers immediate satisfaction. How can we reclaim the essence of Lent as a spiritual discipline in the face of these challenges? By recognizing that true nourishment comes not from hastily consumed pleasures but from a deeply rooted faith, we can find a way forward that upholds the spirit of Lent and embraces the richness of spiritual discipleship amidst the pull of convenience.

"Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship." Romans 12:1-2
